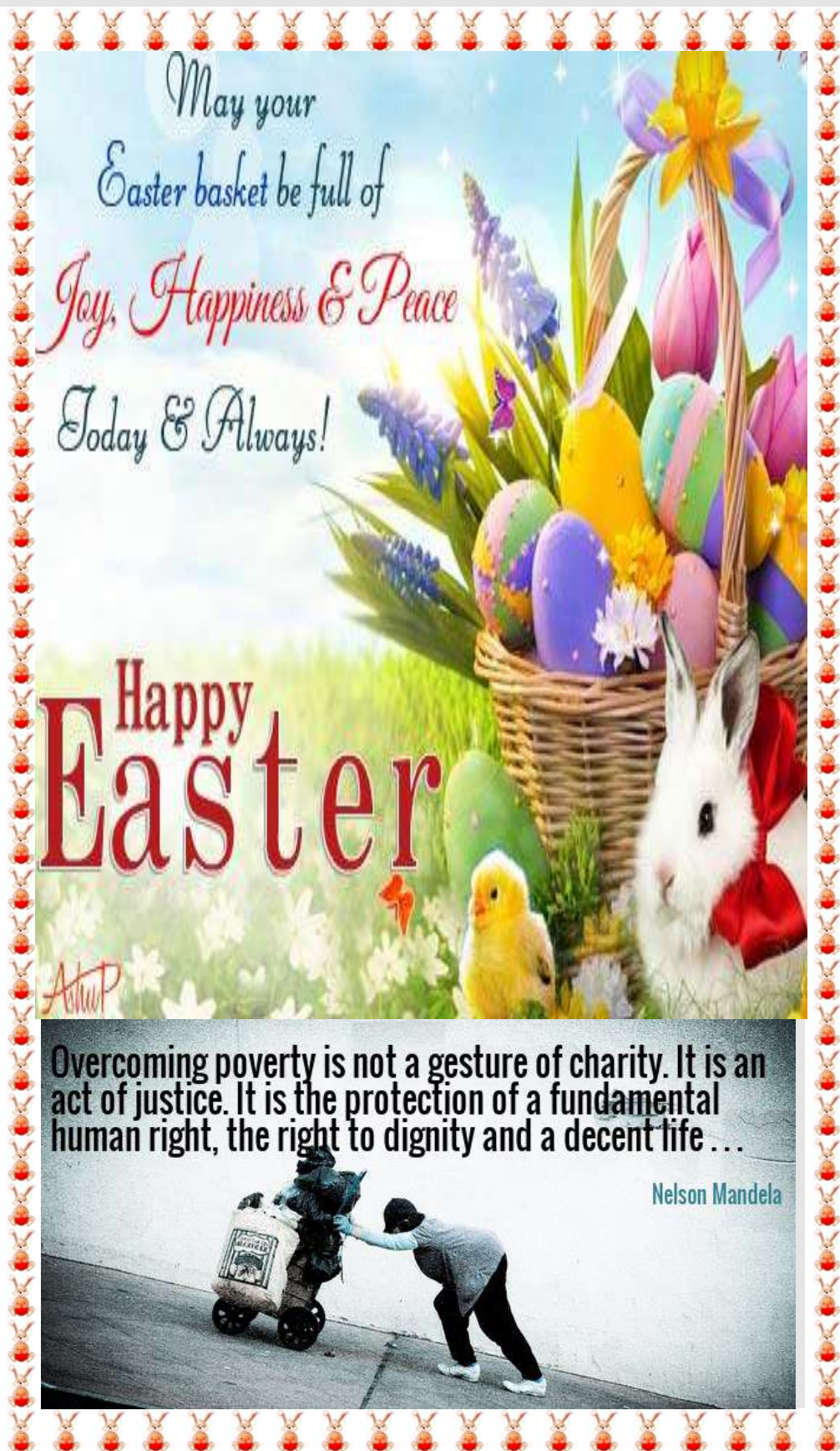

WELFARE BENEFICIARY NEWS - Silvereen Jacotine

The last two quarters have seen a few of our welfare Beneficiaries pass away, and requests were made to the DBU to submit new applications for consideration. From a peak of 215 WB's that were eligible for aid, it was decided that it would be prudent to consider a reduction in the number of WB's and cap this number to 200. This regrettably, was due to the fact that the numbers attending our fund-raising events were declining and impacted on our capacity to raise the necessary funds to sustain 215 WB's.

15 new applications were submitted for our consideration and all applications were tabled at our last committee meeting. Careful consideration were given to all these applications, out of which only five met the criteria as deserving for Welfare Beneficiary status and these applications approved were forwarded to the DBU. We have requested that the DBU have a representative visit and interview these five potential WB's and make necessary checks that all information provided is true and correct before placing them as a Welfare Beneficiary.

These new measures of visiting the selected applicants is necessary and important, as it does provide us with a look at their circumstances and how best the club can assist them in the future. We are mindful of the fact, that our members generously support the Club in the firm belief and expectations that their support and donations in so many ways are being utilized in the best possible manner. Therefore, we make every effort as a committee to ensure that those people we aid are deserving and that they will not be able to make ends meet without the financial assistance we provide.

Together with you, we can continue our good work and look after these poor people in Sri Lanka for many more years to come.

Aundrea , aged 16, (not shown) has currently sat the GCE(OL) . She will be eligible for sponsorship if she advances to GCE(AL) studies.

Over the years there have been many students who have benefitted from the Student Sponsorship Program. Many of these children were from homes where the parents did not have the financial means to further their education. There have been many who had lost a parent, the breadwinner in the family. Tragically, there have been those young innocent children abandoned by their parents and left to the care of relatives or the grandparents. This is one such sad story, where the father had fallen on hard times and the ensuing financial and marital stress has resulted in the mother leaving home and her 6 children. Not having the fortitude to cope, the father sought solace in alcohol and no longer lives with his children. Left to the care of their paternal grandmother, aged in her 60s, with a meagre income, the future of these young children, aged 7 to 16, look bleak. It is sad that these 5 girls and 1 boy, may not receive an education that will surely help better their lives. One wonders how these young lives face the world and their friends, the stress and trauma not having loving parents to care for, provide and protect them. A childhood, perhaps bereft of simple joys, happiness and the carefree life every child deserves. A life without a doubt, dependent on the charity of others.

These 5 young girls at present are receiving their education at Holy Family Convent, Dehiwela. The eldest has sat for her GCE (OL) and the young lad is attending Royal Primary School in Dehiwela. Their future rests on the generosity of someone who can sponsor their educational and personal needs. A hungry stomach finds it hard to concentrate and absorb the diversity of subjects and academic studies. I am sure that the necessities of student life, be it books, uniforms, shoes and other items they need, would be a hard ask for the poor grandmother to give her 6 grandchildren. Finding the basic necessities to feed, clothe and shelter them, must be a challenge in itself. However, like every grandparent, she will bestow all the love she has for these children and pray that God will provide. These 5 children, still attending school, will indeed benefit from your generosity and sponsorship. Please help them to overcome the challenges of life and look to a better future

DONATION TO ST VINCENT'S HOME - MAGGONA , SRI LANKA.

Earlier this year the Eighty Club, Melbourne was saddened to hear of the devastation caused by a cyclone to St. Vincent's Technical School and Home, Maggona, Sri Lanka. This institute for under privileged children, founded in 1881 by the first European missionaries is the first Social Service Institute to be established in Sri Lanka. Some of the children domiciled here are orphans, while there are others abandoned by their families due to financial or personal reasons, children living in difficult circumstances in their homes and youth traumatized and un-manageable at home due to socio/economic reasons.



The institute has a Technical/Vocational Training School and courses are conducted in printing, carpentry, welding, automobile mechanism, and electrical maintenance, to name a few, together with providing guidance, education, training, clothing, medical and board & lodging to these children

The parallel programs of the Eighty Club Melbourne, Student Sponsorship Program and that of the home to protect, educate and train the children demanded we do our utmost to

help repair the facilities at the Home and a donation of A\$1000 from the Eighty Club Melbourne, together with a further sum of A\$300 from Denis Williamsz was handed over to Fr.Roshan and Fr. Dilan Perera for much needed repairs.

Undeniably, all this is only possible due to your generosity and it is also a privilege that the Eighty Club Melbourne can assist other organizations in their time of need. The ultimate goal for each and every one of us is to work together as one, providing care, help and assistance to all those "Less Fortunate"
