FATE or A TEST OF FAITH

As always, the Club, whilst looking at alleviating the needs of the 'Less Fortunate', continue to encourage and help our WB's to improve on their present circumstances and to make them self-sufficient in their lives. No easy task for those eking out an existence and yet there are some families who, with determination try their best to do so. One such family is that of Ishani VanCuylenberg, a single Mum, left to fend for 5 children, by working as a maid and selling king coconuts and betel leaves on the roadside..

Her eldest daughter Sonali, put aside a vocation to be a Catholic nun after successfully completing her GCE (AL) exams decided to enroll in the army. She knew this would help the family financially. Job stability and a secure wage in the army would help with the family fortunes and their future.

After years of struggle the family was finally looking to better times and it was only in the last Newsletter, we highlighted that a re-furbished laptop was presented to Ishani, the Mum. She had enrolled for an external degree at the Sri Jayawardena University, to follow her dream to better her life, her career path and give her children all that a mother yearns to do. The Club was happy that the family fortunes were improving.

Tragically, subsequent to our April Newsletter, young Sonali, now the main breadwinner for the family, was seriously injured whilst travelling in a 3 wheeler or "Tuk-Tuk" (as they are called) and suffered major head trauma, requiring intensive surgery. I do apologise for any distress caused by the pictures of Sonali, which are quite graphic.

I am sure God has a special place for this young lass, who put aside a calling to be a nun, to help her family. Sonali, I am happy to say is on the mend, even though the road ahead to recovery can be long. A test of her faith maybe and yet, her determination to help her family, will see her through. Thankfully her medical needs are taken care of by the army hospital.

Yet, once again the family is now at a crossroad to deal with the day to day necessities of life. **The Mum Ishani, now needs to take care of her daughter and also, her eldest son who is following a course in Hybrid Motor Mechanics at the Wayamba Technical College in Kurunegala finds it hard to pay the course fee of Rs15,000 pm (approx. A\$70). Living away from home, he also has to pay for his daily meals, at times going hungry with no money.**

The Club has assisted the family with a special payment of Rs 45,000 and **anything you can donate in the short term to help this family, will be greatly appreciated.**

It is indeed heartbreaking to see a family striving to better their lives, now compelled to deal with adversity.

As always, I am humbled by your ongoing generosity and commitment to the 'Less Fortunate'.

THANK YOU and with your help we can continue our work.

It was a wonderful experience being there and being able to take her back home and pray for and with her family.

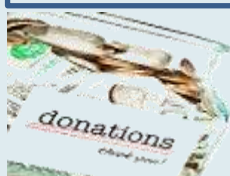
